1. Ross-Kreh Barn

4305 Township Rd 136, McComb

This Wisconsin gambrel-style barn was likely built around the 1940s, but references barn architecture elements closer to what was found in the 1870s-1890s. This property was originally purchased by a man named Samuel Ross in 1835 and is currently owned by Kenneth and Jeanne Kreh, lifetime residents of Hancock County. While this barn is currently stabling cows, it was built with plenty of intentional storage space, likely for hay and other tools. This barn will feature:

2. Nolen Barn

7783 County Rd 97, Findlay

A man named Lewis Bolton acquired this property through a Land Grant from the US in 1893. The barn on site was likely built in the early 20th Century, and shows little signs of adaptation from the original construction. Resembling a Dutch Barn, it was likely used to stable horses. Current owners Erin Diemer and Jason Nolen bought the property in 2025. This barn will feature:

3. Patterson Barn

9755 County Rd 97, Findlay

In 1833, this land was granted to a man named John Reed by the US. It was likely built around the 1850s and was intended purely for hay storage. Then, around 1978, the barn was utilized for a beef cattle operation. Shortly after, in 1980, the Patterson family took ownership, with Melville and Betty Patterson. The current owners, Mel and Doreen Patterson, recently acquired the property in April, 2026. This barn will feature:

4. Boyd-Harris Barn

8926 US Route 224, Findlay

This New England-style storage barn was likely built around the 1920s. The property was originally bought in 1826 by Joseph Wade. The Boyd family took ownership of this land in 1868 when Richard Boyd bought the property. The land then passed through different Boyd family generations, with the current owner, Jane Harris, a descendant, acquiring it in 2007. This barn will feature:

5. McKinnis-Litzenburg Barn

6100 US Route 224, Findlay

While the original barn was estimated to have been built around the 1850s, records show that the property was not acquired until 1878. It was originally bought by Robert McKinnis. Although the original barn structure no longer stands, this reconstruction was made using 70% of the original timber. Now proudly owned by the Hancock County Park District, which took ownership in 1988 from Otta Litzenberg, this well-known barn is a county favorite. This barn will feature:

6. Betscher Barn

12432 Township Rd 168, Findlay

This is notably our most uniquely adapted barn on tour. The land was first acquired by Salom Newell in 1837. The original barn was likely built in the late 1800s, but is nearly unrecognizable. In 1954, Robert Ferrell bought the property, and in the 60s to 70s, adaptations began. Current owners Brandon and Paige Betscher acquired the barn in 2019 and have continued to work on the barn's aesthetics. This barn will feature:
